4. Presentation on Southern Alameda County Integrated Rail Analysis (SoCo INFORMATION Rail Study) Phase 2

Mr. Dan Leavitt gave a presentation on this item.

There were no comments on this item.

Approve a Resolution of the Board of Commissioners of the San Joaquin Regional Rail Commission Authorizing the Executive Director to Submit and Execute Any and All Grant Applications, Agreements, Certifications, and Assurances and Any Other Documents Necessary to the California State Transportation Agency to obtain State Rail Assistance (SRA) Funding in the Amount of \$250,000 for the Union City Intermodal Station Phase 3 Project

(Regular and Special Voting Members)

Mr. Dan Leavitt and Ms. Angela Miller gave a presentation on this item.

Commissioner Craig inquired about the funding amount going down in future years, and suggested using the funding while these sources are available.

Ms. Miller explained that the State Rail Assistance Program (SRA) is only a fiveyear program and may potentially sunset in 2024 or 2025 if there is not legislation to extend it.

Commissioner Craig expressed that it is sad to see a funding source go away, and wanted to make a point about taking advantage of the funding source while it is available.

Chair Zuber inquired about the \$3 million dollars in SRA funds available, and if the additional \$4 million dollars in funding would also be SRA funds in addition to the other \$3 million dollars.

Mr. Leavitt explained that the additional \$3 million dollars in funding would be from Alameda County Transportation Commission (ACTC) funds for Measure B, and the \$3 million dollars in SRA funding would be for the environmental phase of this project.

Mr. Michael Barnbaum commented that Richmond is a great intermodal facility where passengers can connect to BART on today's service and a similar concept could happen at the Union City station. Mr. Barnbaum recommended having a joint board meeting between the Rail Commission and the San Joaquin Joint Powers Authority for items that have common interest that will be presented. Mr. Barnbaum recommended that the board adopt this item unanimously.

6. Approve a Resolution of the Board of Commissioners of the San Joaquin ACTION Regional Rail Commission Authorizing Special Train(s) Service (Regular and Special Voting Members)

Mr. Marques Cook and Mr. Nathan Alastra gave a presentation on this item.

Commissioner Craig commented that when initially hearing about the ACE service, the special trains were what the passengers commonly referred to, specifically attending baseball games on ACE, and is happy to see that this is available again to passengers. Commissioner Craig commented in appreciation of the marketing efforts and that there are a lot of baseball fans, especially in the Lodi area, and is sure that there will be a significant ridership for the special trains.

Commissioner Craig inquired if group tickets were available or if there were only single tickets available for purchase.

Mr. Cook explained that group ticketing isn't available thus far for the special trains, however staff can take this into consideration and see how group tickets can be leveraged for the special trains service. Mr. Cook explained that Mr. Freddy Rodriguez has a presentation later in the meeting explaining the group travel that ACE has handled successfully.

Commissioner Craig inquired about the opportunity to get sponsors from the companies and vendors who would benefit from the ridership that will be attending these special events in order to underwrite some of these expenses.

Mr. Cook explained that the event venues are not looking to invest financially in the service, however they are interested in offering a trade partnership, which includes promoting ACE on their social media or intel communication as a means of travel to the events and allows staff to use some of their brand assets and their logos where the agreements are in place. Mr. Cook explained that this partnership will encourage people to utilize the service.

Commissioner Craig suggested radio broadcast among other channels would be a great opportunity to help with the ACE marketing efforts.

Vice Chair Young inquired if the \$20-\$30 ticket price described in the presentation would be for a round trip or single, one-way ticket.

Mr. Cook explained that the price indicates round-trip fares.

Vice Chair Young commented that it is great that ACE is becoming known again not just for commuting, but for the ability to utilize the service to go to Great America and to attend the special events. Vice Chair Young commented that she is glad that ACE is connecting people together post pandemic.

Commissioner Warmsley commented that she is excited to see the Stockton Ports mentioned and that this is something that she will bring back to City Council to see how the City can be a good steward and neighbor, and to bring the City of Stockton and the Central Valley to the forefront with supporting this item.

Mr. Cook explained that ACE currently has a partnership with the Stockton Ports and there has been organized ticket giveaways for the Stockton Ports games on the social media channels, and the Rail Commission is looking to work with the local community in addition to destination partners along the ACE route.

Commissioner Mei asked staff to keep in mind special service, or an ACE outreach booth at the Fremont Art and Wine Festival that has returned inperson. Commissioner Mei explained that it is the largest outdoor festival west of the Mississippi and draws about 300,000 attendees and would be a good crowd to market awareness to the service. Commissioner Mei explained that they are hoping people will consider alternative public transit, and it is within walking distance to BART. Commissioner Mei explained that due to the estimated turnout, they want to encourage micro mobility options to avoid the need for parking and that are green for the community.

Ms. Mortensen explained that looking forward on the agenda, Mr. Rene Gutierrez is going to present an item on the successful Community Assistance Program (CAP), and if the board is interested, staff can pursue this avenue to see if the current funding source will allow the program to cover these special trains. Ms. Mortensen explained that CAP is a discount for the lower income community, and there have been testimonials about how important the program is to be able to access jobs in the Central Valley. Ms. Mortensen asked the board to consider that direction, and apologized for not including the CAP presentation earlier in the meeting to the board.

Chair Zuber inquired if the Rail Commission board can make a motion that it approves the proposed schedule and the application of any ticketing programs in order to have the flexibility to include CAP with the special trains. Ms. Mortensen explained that the board can make the recommendations with the fare structure, however staff could take the direction from the board to explore the CAP program being implemented for this year's special trains.

Vice Chair Young motioned to move staff's recommendation as amended to include the option for staff to include CAP program and to explore the group travel options for the special trains.

Mr. Barnbaum commented that after talking to the Rail Commission's Marketing Manager, Mr. David Lipari, he understands that today's item is regarding the existing service and is not looking at anything futuristically, however wanted to go on record that passengers in Sacramento are excited to eventually be part of the discussion in an item like this in the future with the Midtown, Natomas, and Elk Grove Stations starting in 2026. Mr. Barnbaum inquired if the Rail Commission and the San Joaquin Joint Powers Authority together could explore this item annually with future partnerships with the Stockton Kings, Sacramento Kings, and the Sacramento Republic FC of the United Soccer League as they could be great partnerships in the future as the five Valley Rail Stations up North come online. Mr. Barnbaum explained that this could be part of an integrated special service request to be approved annually in future years by both the Rail Commission and the San Joaquin Joint Powers Authority.

Commissioner Craig commented that she appreciated Mr. Barnbaum's comment in regards to new stations coming on line in the future. Commissioner Craig explained that there is an economic impact with the special train costs with an added value, and assumes that moving forward the Rail Commission will look at an economic assessment of future opportunities with the special trains. Commissioner Craig commented that she is interested to see the benefits of these opportunities and thinks that they are great ideas, and is interested in the costs associated with the stops at the stations. Commissioner Craig suggested that towards the 2026 station openings, staff could assess and provide the board more information regarding the values of the special trains.

Chair Zuber explained that the direction with the implementation of future stations would move to the point where there would not need to be discussion of special trains any longer because if the patterns discussed come to fruition in the next few years, the trains will run every day anyway. Chair Zuber explained that the special trains are an interim step as the Rail Commission grows into something a lot bigger.

Commissioner Warmsley commented that this item is a forward-thinking discussion for families that may not be able to afford to drive to different venues. Commissioner Warmsley commented that Mr. Barnbaum's comment in regard to partnerships with different sport teams brought awareness to other events including Stockton Food Fest, the Garlic Festival, and the Asparagus Festival and bringing forward inclusivity to other populations in the Central Valley to have the opportunity to access these events. Commissioner Warmsley explained that this discussion for the special trains brings higher standards and aids residents and communities collectively.

7. Local Funding Sources for Green and Affordable Housing Near Rail INFORMATION Transportation

Mr. Dan Leavitt gave a presentation on this item.

Commissioner Craig inquired in terms of the grant programs, if there are local or regional matches required.

Mr. Leavitt explained that it depends on the grant, and as an example, the Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant that is being looked at with the City of Lodi, staff time was determined as a match rather than a dollar amount.

Mr. Bissegger explained it varies whether grant programs do or do not require a match, and the Solutions for Congested Corridors Program that was mentioned in the presentation does not require a funding match. Mr. Bissegger explained that some of the SB1 Programs due require a funding match, such as the local partnership program that requires a 50% match, which is the highest requirement typically seen for local matching funds. Mr. Bissegger explained that the local matching funds do not need to be strictly a cities' local funds, but could be other Federal Grant funds that have already been awarded or will be awarded. Mr. Bissegger explained that on the federal side, the typical funding match is 20%, however the Reconnecting Communities Program is unique in that it will only pay for 50% of a project's cost and requires 20% of the match to be nonfederal funds.

Commissioner Craig commented that when it is time to review the budget, the City of Lodi has the benefit of surplus funds available, and are looking at funding the downtown specific-plan that has a dollar amount substantial enough to merit a future application to this program, and expects that rail and transit are an essential component to the Downtown Lodi area.

Mr. Barnbaum commented on some examples of transit-oriented development in the Sacramento area at or near stations including the Wexler student housing complex at the University 56th Street light rail station that services five bus routes and is in walking distance to the Sacramento State campus. Mr. Barnbaum commented on the complex between the Royal Oaks bike rail station on the blue line that services two bus routes and is in North Sacramento by Arden Way and another housing project called Marisol Village off of North 12th street near a future light rail station called Dos Rios Station on the blue line.

8. ACE Means-Based Discounted Ticketing Program Update

Mr. Rene Gutierrez gave a presentation on this item.

Commissioner Warmsley inquired about the media toolkit.

Ms. Mortensen requested that Mr. Gutierrez reach out directly to each Commissioner and their cities.

Mr. Gutierrez commented that he will send out the toolkit in order to get their cities' engagement.

There were no public comments on this item.

9. 2023 ACE School Group Season

INFORMATION

Mr. Freddy Rodriguez gave a presentation on this item.

Ms. Mortensen inquired if Mr. Rodriguez mentioned that there were smaller groups out of the Alameda County area of Pleasanton.

Mr. Rodriguez explained that there was a smaller group out of Pleasanton that was approximately 20 students, so ACE serviced Alameda County as well.

There were no public comments on this item.

10. Board Member Comments

Vice Chair Young commented that the third annual Tracy Connects Event will be held on September 9th and that it would be great to have ACE represented to promote the different services offered for the community again this year as they did for last year's event.

Commissioner Mei commented that League of California Cities has their conference in the fall this year in Sacramento and recommended sending a reminder to people that alternative local public transit options are available that can be supported and to help alleviate traffic.

Commissioner Craig commented that the Lodi Street Fair is on October 2nd and it would be great to have ACE represented there as well.

11. Ex-Officio Comments

Mr. Ken Baxter of SJRTD commented that on Saturday June 3rd, SJRTD participated in Children and Youth Day at Pixie Woods in Stockton, and staff and volunteers were available to provide information and answer questions how public transportation can help parents and families. Mr. Baxter commented that

on June 14th, SJRTD participated in the Downtown Stockton Strategic Visioning Workshop, and explained that the City of Stockton is working with a consultant and others to develop a five-year plan to revitalize downtown Stockton which would hopefully have opportunities for Transit Oriented Development (TOD), and SJRTD provided transit-related information during the meeting, including their focus to enhance transit frequencies in disadvantaged areas. Mr. Baxter reported that SJRTD system-wide ridership is trending up and they are at roughly 8,746 riders on a daily basis.

Mr. Tom Dumas of Caltrans commented that the state of California recently honored 11 Caltrans employees with the Governor's State Employee Medal of Valor which is the highest award that California bestows on public servants, and these are given to state employees for acts of heroism above and beyond their normal call of duty. Mr. Dumas explained that out of these employees honored, two of the were from District 10 in Merced County, and they are maintenance workers that were able to save a man that was trapped in a burning vehicle. Mr. Dumas explained that since they started in 1959, there have been 16 Caltrans employees who have earned this high honor. Mr. Dumas explained that Caltrans is sponsoring the Modesto Nuts home games this summer on Sundays, and the District invites everyone out to John Thurman Field in Modesto for the family night games, and this Sunday they will be playing the Stockton Ports. Mr. Dumas encouraged everyone to follow Caltrans on their Facebook, Twitter, and other social media for the latest news and updates.

Ms. Sue Zwahlen of StanCOG thanked everyone who participated in their ribbon cutting event for the reopening of the historic transit center, and it was all about preparing to get the train to Modesto. Ms. Zwahlen commented that StanCOG got approval of their Sustainable Community Strategy which allows the Rail Commission to get their award on their Trade Corridor Enhancement Program (TCEP) Grant Application for \$40 million dollars. Ms. Zwahlen thanked the California Air Resources Board for that approval.

12. Executive Director's Report

Ms. Mortensen reported that the TCEP award is \$40 million dollars towards the double-track portion of the extension down to Turlock and is paired with the TIRCP application, and staff is seeking another batch of federal funding to complete the full Turlock expansion from the current terminus at Ceres. Ms. Mortensen reported that the Rail Commission is tentatively expected to receive another state-related award out of the freight mobility program, and explained that this is a portion of the Stockton Diamond Improvements that help keep a connection from the Union Pacific to Burlington Northern Santa Fe and Port of Stockton access during the 14 stages of construction. Ms. Mortensen explained that there are several stages where there won't be access so staff has to create duplicate access to keep the trains moving through that area and this is jointly funded by Union Pacific and the Rail Commission with the bulk of the funding coming from the state. Ms. Mortensen commented that Mr. David Lipari and Mr. Marques Cook's team did great survey work of both the ACE and the Amtrak San Joaquins passengers which will be presented at the next Rail Commission meeting in August.







FY 2024 APPROPRIATIONS UPDATE/PROCESS

The House and Senate Full Committees on Appropriations have both approved their FY 2024 Transportation, Housing and Urban Development (THUD) bills. The House

approved their bill (HR 4820) on July 18, with a vote of 34 to 27, and the Senate approved their bill (S 2437) on July 20, with a vote of 29-0. A listing of House Community Project Funding requests can be found here, and a listing of Senate Congressionally Directed Spending projects can be found here. [The House Committee on Appropriations also approved the FY 2023 Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies bill on July 19, by a vote of 33-27 which included a Community Project Funding earmark for the City of <u>Stockton for Diamond Sewer Upsizing Project</u> (Sponsored by Cong. Josh Harder – D-CA) for \$959,757.] The House and Senate THUD Reports can be found here, and here, respectively. The House PR notes that "The THUD bill provides a discretionary total of \$90.243 billion, which is \$8.633 billion (8.7 percent) below the President's Budget Request", while the Senate PR notes that "The THUD FY 2024 appropriations bill provides \$98.931 billion in total discretionary funding." The general theme of the House bill is that of reduced spending and "rightsizing transportation infrastructure spending." The House reductions are part of a push by House conservatives to cut federal spending beyond the levels agreed to as part of the negotiations earlier this year to raise the federal debt limit. Several transportation highlights include: no additional funding for RAISE grants and reduced funding for Community Project Funding member requests, across all modes. RAISE and several popular, competitive grant programs do receive baseline advance appropriations within the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act.

Overall, Senate appropriations for transportation were up slightly or flat with 2023 levels. For example, the Senate bill provided \$800 million, in addition to the \$1.5 billion of advance appropriations, for the RAISE program (House \$0.0 for RAISE outside of advanced appropriations), provided \$573 million for the Consolidated Rail Infrastructure and Safety Improvements Program (House \$258.5 million), and provided \$2.45 billion for Amtrak in opposition to the \$875 million provided in the House bill. However, in terms of earmarks (FAA/FHWA/FRA/FTA) the Senate provide \$1.076 billion as opposed to the House level of \$1.745 billion. The Senate is generally moving all of the regular bills above or in line with spending caps set by the 2023 Fiscal Responsibility Act, which President Biden negotiated with House Republicans in order to raise the debt ceiling. With the exception that Senate Appropriations Chair Patty Murray (D-WA) and Vice Chair Susan Collins (R-ME) announced recently that they would introduce a supplemental appropriations bill to boost ordinary appropriations levels by \$13.7 billion above the Fiscal Responsibility Act (FRA) caps, designating the funding as emergency spending to avoid violating the caps. See Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget analysis here, which estimates that such an action would add an additional \$155 billion in borrowing into the future. In a July 9, Dear Colleague letter, Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY) said, "In the Senate, we are working diligently through regular order on a bipartisan basis to advance appropriations bills." When Congress returns after Labor Day from its August recess, it will be tenuous, at best, to finish all of the appropriations bills by the end of September, making a short stopgap funding measure (Continuing Resolution/CR) a strong possibility. That is, when Congress returns in September the House will have only 12 legislative days in session (the Senate 17 days) before the beginning of FY 2024 on October 1, and current appropriation bills expire. If Congress fails to successfully conference and pass appropriations bills by January, 1, 2024, an automatic across-the-board Continuing Resolution (CR) will kick in for the rest of the year at 1 percent less than the funding level each federal office and program received in fiscal 2023.



<u>July 13, 2023</u>. The US Department of Treasury issued its <u>Monthly Treasury Statement Receipts and</u> <u>Outlays of the United States Government For FY 2023 Through June 30, 2023</u>. The government scored a \$228 billion deficit in the month of June 2023 with total June receipts reaching \$418 billion against June outlays of \$646 billion. The FY 2023 cumulative deficit for the nine-month period ending in June is \$1.393 trillion

June 28, 2023. The Congressional Budget **Office (CBO) released its Long-Term Budget Outlook**, which shows debt rising to 181 percent of GDP by 2053 under CBO's current baseline. CBO's new extended baseline shows a somewhat improved long-term outlook than in its July 2022 Long-Term Budget Outlook, thanks in large part to the \$1.5 trillion of ten-year savings in the recently-enacted Fiscal Responsibility Act. As a share of the economy, the 2053 deficit will be nearly 3 times larger than the 50-year historical average of 3.6 percent of GDP. CBO expects budget deficits to grow steadily over the next three decades. In nominal dollars, the deficit will grow from



\$1.4 trillion in FY 2022 to \$1.5 trillion in 2023, \$2.5 trillion in 2033, \$4.6 trillion in 2043, and \$8.0 trillion in 2053. **Under CBO's estimates, the Highway Trust Fund will exhaust its reserves by 2028**. <u>July 26, 2023</u>. The Senate Budget Committee held a Full Committee hearing to discuss and receive testimony on matters pertaining to, "Beyond the Breaking Point: The Fiscal Consequences of Climate Change on Infrastructure." <u>Committee Link and Testimony</u>.

<u>July 26, 2023</u>. The Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works, Subcommittee on Clean Air, Climate and Nuclear Safety held a hearing to discuss and receive testimony on matters pertaining to "<u>Cleaner Trains</u>: <u>Opportunities for Reducing Emissions from America's Rail Network</u>." <u>Committee Link and</u> <u>Testimony</u>.

<u>July 20, 2023</u>. The Senate Committee on Appropriations held a Full Committee markup of the: 1.) <u>FY 2024</u> <u>Energy and Water Development appropriations bill</u>, 2.) <u>FY 2024 State, Foreign Operations appropriations</u> <u>bill</u>, and 3.) <u>Transportation, Housing and Urban Development appropriations bill</u>. The Committee approved all of the three aforementioned bills by votes of 29-0, 27-2, and 29-0, respectively. <u>Committee Link</u> and Committee Press Release <u>here</u>.

<u>July 18, 2023</u>. The House Committee on Appropriations held a Full Committee markup of the FY 2024 Transportation, Housing and Urban Development (THUD) bill. The bill was approved by a vote of 34 to 27 (press release <u>here</u>). <u>Committee Link</u>.

<u>July 12, 2023</u>. The House Committee on Appropriations, Subcommittee on Transportation, Housing and Urban Development held a markup of the <u>FY 2024 Transportation, Housing and Urban Development</u> (<u>THUD</u>) <u>bill</u>. The THUD FY 2024 Appropriations Bill was approved and forwarded to the full Committee, without amendment. See THUD bill summary <u>here</u>. <u>Committee Link</u>.

<u>July 9, 2023</u>. Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY) dispatched a <u>Dear Colleague Letter</u> detailing the agenda for the upcoming work period. The letter states policy work in the areas of: "bills that lower the cost of insulin and prescription drugs, combat the fentanyl crisis, unlock permitting reform, advance online safety and innovation, promote community health, hold bank executives accountable, <u>address rail safety</u>, <u>modernize federal aviation programs</u>, institute common-sense farm policy, safeguard cannabis banking, compete with the Chinese government, and more."

RAIL SAFETY BILL SUMMARY

The Senate Commerce Committee passed (16 to 11) the bipartisan <u>Railway Safety Act of 2023 (\$ 576</u>) on May 10, sending it to the full Senate. The legislation was introduced by Ohio and Pennsylvania Senators Sherrod Brown, J.D. Vance, Bob Casey, and John Fetterman following the East Palestine, Ohio, derailment. The Railway Safety Act, as amended by the Senate Commerce Committee, gives the US DOT broad authority to issue new regulations on trains carrying hazardous materials, train length, railcar inspections, wayside defect detectors, and train crew size. A summary of its key provisions can be found <u>here</u>. Meanwhile, in the House Congressman Chris Deluzio introduced a companion bill (<u>The Railway Safety Act of 2023</u> - HR 1674). The House Republican majority have suggested any legislation should wait until the National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) completes its investigation. Another rail safety bill in the House, <u>Reducing Accidents in Locomotives</u> (HR 1633 - RAIL) Act, has bipartisan support from Ohio members of the House and is sponsored by Congressman Bill Johnson, whose district includes East Palestine.

UPCOMING NOFOs in AUGUST:

- <u>August</u> FRA will announce the availability of \$104 million through the <u>FY22-23 Restoration and</u> <u>Enhancement Grant Program</u>, funding operating assistance grants for initiating, restoring, or enhancing intercity passenger rail transportation. Later in August, FRA will host a webinar to provide a program overview for potential grantees.
- <u>August</u> FRA will announce the availability of \$139 million in <u>FY22-23 Special Transportation</u> <u>Circumstances (STC) Grant Program</u> funding for capital rail projects in states that lack intercity passenger rail service or that are not connected to the national rail system—specifically, the states of Alaska, South Dakota, and Wyoming.


<u>July 20, 2023</u>. The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) <u>announced</u> awards of \$20,041,613 to 47 communities under the <u>FY 2023 Areas of Persistent Poverty (AoPP) Program</u>. Awards are for planning, engineering, or development of technical or financing plans for projects to assist Areas of Persistent Poverty or Historically Disadvantaged Communities. Investments from the Areas of Persistent Poverty program can be used to support efforts to initiate transit service as well as improve service and modernize fleets, from procuring low- and no-emission buses, to launching scheduling apps and improving bus stops. FTA received applications totaling close to \$36 million in funding requests. See project awards <u>here</u>.

<u>July 5, 2023</u>. The <u>US DOT released</u> a FY 2023 Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) making available \$198 million for the <u>Reconnecting Communities and Pilot (RCP) Program</u>, and another NOFO making \$3.155 billion available under the <u>FY 2023 Neighborhood Access and Equity Program (NAE)</u>. The US DOT combined these two programs into a single joint NOFO (RCN Program) to provide a more efficient application process for project sponsors. While they remain separate programs for the purposes of awards, the programs share many common characteristics.

Applicants may choose to apply for only one grant program; however, this combined solicitation will allow applicants to apply for both funding opportunities by submitting one application. [See nearby RCP/NAE graphic.] Under the combined RCN Program, US DOT is offering three grant types: <u>Community Planning</u> <u>Grants, Capital Construction Grants</u>, and <u>Regional Partnerships</u> <u>Challenge Grants</u>. Program funding splits are as follows (nearby chart).

US DOT has created a joint RCN website with additional information and will be hosting several informational webinars for

prospective grant applicants in the



following weeks. Applications must be submitted by 11:59 PM EDT, September 28, 2023.

- \$198 million for the Reconnecting Communities Pilot Program, of which:
 - \$148 million is for Capital Construction Grant funds, and
 - $\circ~$ \$50 million is for Community Planning Grants, including funding for technical assistance.
- \$3.155 billion for the Neighborhood Access and Equity Program, of which the Department expects to award up to:
 - $\circ~$ \$135 million to Community Planning Grants,
 - \$2.57 billion to Capital Construction Grants, and
 - \$450 million to Regional Partnerships Challenge Grants, designed to incentivize regions to come together to leverage both federal, state, and regional funding and policies to tackle problems.

<u>July 18, 2023</u>. The Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) issued a <u>Notice of Availability/Request for</u> <u>Comments</u> concerning the request from twenty host railroads for amendment to their approved Positive Train Control Safety Plans (PTCSP). The Request For Amendment (RFA) proposes an alternative to the definition of "initial terminal." Comments are due 20 days after the Notice is published in the Federal Register (scheduled for publication on July 19, 2023).


<u>July 12, 2023</u>. The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) issued a <u>Notice of Availability of Proposed</u> <u>Circular/Request for Comments</u> seeking public comment on a new, consolidated circular entitled, "<u>Grant</u> <u>Programs for Urbanized Areas: Program Guidance and Application Instructions</u>" which consolidates and replaces the circulars for the Urbanized Area Formula Grants Program, the State of Good Repair Grants Program, and the Urbanized Area formula component of the Grants for Buses and Bus Facilities Program. **Comments must be submitted by September 11, 2023**.

GOVERNMENT NOTICES/REPORTS/NEWS ARTICLES

<u>July 6, 2023</u>. The Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) issued a <u>Safety Bulletin 2023-04</u> following a fatality that occurred on June 26, involving a CSX conductor trainee (CT) at the Port of Baltimore's Seagirt Marine Terminal. The purpose of the Safety Bulletin "is to ensure the railroad industry is aware of this recent accident that resulted in a fatality of an employee. Its purpose is to also encourage railroads to identify location-specific safety issues to cover during safety briefings and (re)train employees."

UPCOMING CONGRESSIONAL CALENDAR – AUGUST/SEPTEMBER

The Senate and House are not in session during the month of August. The "August Recess" provides an opportunity for Senators and Representatives to leave Washington, DC, and to travel to their home states and districts for constituent meetings, town halls, and other community events. After July 28 (the last day both the Senate/House are in session in July), the Senate is scheduled to return on September 5, and the House is scheduled to return on September 12, 2023.

A <u>CN press release</u> noted, "For the fifteenth consecutive year, CN has earned a place on the Corporate Knights Best 50 Corporate Citizens list and placed first among its peers within the freight transport, all modes category." To determine the ranking, Corporate Knights analyzed 286 large Canadian organizations against Canadian and global industry peers. Corporate Knights assessed companies' performance using 25 key performance indicators (KPIs) covering resource management, employee management, financial management, sustainable revenue, sustainable investment, and supplier performance.

June 29, 2023. The <u>California Transportation Commission announced and approved \$25 million in funds</u> <u>from Solutions for Congested Corridors Program (SCCP) for Placer County Transportation Planning</u> <u>Authority (PCTPA) and the Capitol Corridor Joint Powers Authority (CCJPA)</u>, to support Phase 1 of the Sacramento to Roseville 3rd Main Track Project (SR3T). Phase 1 of the SR3T involves construction work and track improvements that will allow the Capitol Corridor to operate up to three round trips (6 trains) daily between Sacramento and Roseville, increasing service from the current single daily round trip. Once fully completed, the SR3T Phase 1 project will construct approximately 7 miles of third main track and a new layover/servicing facility for Capitol Corridor trains in Roseville.

<u>July 26, 2023</u>. The Automobile Association of America (AAA) national average gas price can be found <u>here</u> (price per gallon as of 7/26/23). One month ago, the average price for regular gas was \$3.573 and one year ago the average price was \$4.327. <u>Related Item</u>: The Department of Energy's (DOE) Office of Petroleum Reserves <u>announced</u> on July 7, that it plans to purchase about 6 million barrels of oil for the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR), with receipts scheduled for October and November 2023. The purchases come as the nation's oil reserve is at its lowest point in 40 years following a historic 180-million-barrel drawdown in the wake of Rus

<u>July 14, 2023</u>. The American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO) has appointed <u>Jean Ruestman</u> – administrator for the Office of Passenger Transportation at the Michigan Department of Transportation – to a two-year term as vice chair of its <u>Council on Public Transportation</u>. AASHTO also named <u>Edwin Sniffen</u> – director of the Hawaii Department of Transportation – to a two-year term as chair of its <u>Council on Water Transportation</u>.

July 3, 2023. Ohio Governor Mike DeWine requested that President Joseph R. Biden issue a Major Presidential Disaster Declaration. The Governor's <u>letter</u> notes that, "On March 7, 2023, the State of Ohio was granted an extension until July 3, 2023 to request a Major Presidential Disaster Declaration relating to the train derailment and release of hazardous chemicals that occurred in East Palestine, Ohio from February 3, 2023 through February 6, 2023." The letter continues, "The possibility remains that the voluntary support provided by Norfolk Southern could at some point in the future cease, and this Declaration is needed to ensure that the State and Federal government use all resources available to step in and provide the community with needed assistance.

July 1, 2023. Forbes reports that as of July 1, nine states have increased the taxes they collect on each gallon of fuel. Three are imposing new taxes on electric vehicle charging stations.

June 29, 2023. The Association of American Railroads (AAR – members include all of the Class I freight railroads) <u>filed a law suit</u> against Ohio Attorney General David Yost, and several Ohio Public Utilities Commissioners to seek to block the state's (Ohio's) twoperson train crew mandate (Ohio's

Monthly Report on Silicon Valley Outreach Activities

Background:

To accomplish continued engagement of key stakeholders, the San Joaquin Regional Rail Commission (Rail Commission) has retained a local, embedded grassroots Outreach Consultant/Team for the Silicon Valley (which includes the Tri-Cities area of Fremont, Newark, and Union City) and another for the Tri-Valley (Livermore/Dublin/Pleasanton) area. Outreach consultants have been an important component of the Rail Commission's approach to stakeholder engagement. The Outreach Consultant/Teams will focus their efforts on stakeholder engagement and strategic partnerships.

At the June 4, 2021, Board Meeting, the Rail Commission Board approved contracts for ACE Silicon Valley Outreach Services (Winter Consulting) and ACE Tri-Valley Outreach Services (California Gold Advocacy Group). The Rail Commission Board also requested that staff provide monthly summaries to the Board of the work done under these contracts.







Background:

Currently, ridership for ACE continues to fluctuate between 30-40% of pre-COVID performance. This plateau in ridership is directly impacted by the number of fully remote and hybrid workers that rode with greater frequency prior to the pandemic. Reports from the Bay Area Council, as well as surveys administered by Rail Commission staff indicate that the majority of regular riders (those using the service 3-5 times per week) have already returned to the service, with no significant change in ridership patterns anticipated in the next six months.

The recent market surveys administered by Rail Commission staff indicate that many residents in the ACE service area are unaware of the service. Those unaware of the service represent both untapped business travelers and not previously targeted leisure travelers. As part of an incremental ridership growth strategy, staff recommends offering promotional fares via the mobile app to target both the untapped business and new leisure riders. Similar to the strategy for the new ACE 10-Ride, the ability to offer promotional offers would provide benefits such as:

- Building brand awareness
- Reach specific audiences with small-group discounts
- Develop destination-based discounts
- Focus ridership growth by day and/or train

Through the management of the San Joaquins, there have been lessons learned by Rail Commission staff that can be adapted for the ACE service when it comes to growing incremental ridership. By strategically deploying promotional fares, our advertising messaging can be diversified to include families and small groups with incentives to ride the service for leisure trips, for example, in addition to continuing to do outreach to the commuter audience. Being able to target multiple audiences will expand our advertising reach throughout our service area. Additionally, survey data revealed that the perception of cost was a barrier for travel. Promotional offers would address this directly and allow new riders to get acquainted with existing fare programs that might suit their ongoing needs. The promotions will focus on single or round-trip savings.

An important aspect of this program will be the ability to work quickly to implement, test, measure, and shift promotions. Staff recommends providing authority for the Executive Director to approve promotions for a specific period of time. Staff will provide a follow-up report to the board for each promotion.

Update on Upcoming ACE Outreach Events

Background:

A key part of grassroots outreach is having an ACE booth (staffed by local outreach representatives and/or Rail Commission staff) at community events throughout the ACE Corridor. Student Incentive Program Update

Background:

The San Joaquin Regional Rail Commission (Rail Commission) has partnered with San Jose State University, Santa Clara University and Los Positas College to develop and provide discounted ACE tickets to students and faculty who commute to campus from within the corridor. This pilot program was created to provide up to a 50% discount on 20-Trip and monthly passes to encourage the use of the train over traveling by car to and from campus.

Staff works with on-campus Departments of Transportation and Parking services to help promote the program and sell paper tickets to students and faculty. In the case of Los Positas, staff coordinates with Livermore Amador Valley Transit Authority (LAVTA) to promote the program to students and faculty and sell the discounted tickets. Additionally, LAVTA provides first-and last-mile solutions to Los Positas via route 30R.
